ABOUT THE SEMINAR

The Department of History organizes an international seminar themed "Redefining India: Politics of Historical Narratives and Changing Contours of National Identity." It is organized in the occasion of the platinum jubilee of the college and silver jubilee of the department. It is an interesting coincidence that the Republic of India is also celebrating its 75th anniversary in the coming year.

The seminar aims at exploring the complexities of Indian nationalism, shaped by various narratives such as historical accounts, popular culture, and subaltern perspectives.

Traditional narratives tend to emphasize select figures and events, sidelining alternative viewpoints, particularly from marginalized communities. Elite historians typically construct a linear, cohesive version of India's national history, legitimizing the nation-state while popular culture reinforces these narratives, shaping public consciousness.

Subaltern perspectives are often excluded from mainstream discourse, a form of epistemic violence that silences marginalized voices from defining the nation.

This seminar critically examines the ways in which various narratives interact and the implications of excluding subaltern perspectives. It aims at promoting dialogues on the importance of integrating diverse voices into national identity discussions, challenging dominant narrative structures and fostering a more inclusive and pluralistic vision of India's past and future.
